As a child protection organisation, the best interest of the child is our top priority. Children should not have to make an effort to be seen and loved. Children should be able to retain their light-heartedness.

But in life, sometimes violent storms rage shaking the security that promises protection. Many young people are burdened with a particularly heavy emotional backpack. With our manifold and preventive forms of support, we strive to provide these children and young people with a loving home and a happy childhood.

This made us all the more concerned when investigations showed in May 2021 that the protection of children in some of the international care services offered by SOS Children's Villages was not always consistently given. As the founding country and brand owner, SOS Children's Villages Austria has since been advocating for a structured process of dealing with the allegations and incidents throughout the Federation. In order to quickly implement the recommendations of the Child Protection Commission appointed by us, we use all means at our disposal.

We have opted for this consistent and transparent solution path in order to ensure the necessary protection and a safe home for children and young people worldwide at SOS Children's Villages.


THIS IS SOS CHILDREN'S VILLAGES



Since our foundation in 1949 in Tyrol, it has been our goal to enable children and young people to have a happy childhood and a positive future despite adverse circumstances. The children's well-being comes first.

A new home: stable and loving. Young people have different needs. That is why we care for children and young people in the most appropriate way possible. The aim is always to provide them with a stable and loving home: Children who cannot live with their families, either temporarily or long term, are taken care of by our pedagogues in an SOS Children's Villages family or group home and receive intensive support. The often traumatised young people find stable structures and reliable relationships in a family-like environment. We involve parents and close reference persons in the process.

Growing up in the SOS Children's Village **Salzburg.** Damien is three years old when he comes to the SOS Children's Village in Seekirchen. It will be his new home. He grows up in an SOS family, goes to school in Seekirchen and now, at the age of 19 years, he is looking forward to his final apprenticeship exam as an electrical technician – he was the only one of his age group to pass with distinction. His next steps towards a self-determined future: military service and then a permanent position with his training company, which "does not want to do without this hard-working employee".

Mobile family support: working out effective solutions

The Brunner family lives with their 3 children at a farm in Styria. After two strokes of fate, a family escalation threatens. The mother plucks up the courage to ask for help. Two family counsellors from SOS Children's Villages visit the family regularly to support it. Today, the family has everyday life under control. Susi Brunner about the "family tool": "Everyone is allowed to say, I am not feeling well, I am angry. The important thing is that it is accepted, and this works for us. Before it escalates, everyone goes


in Vienna and Carinthia are important contact points for professional diagnosis and treatment of mental illnesses. Multi-professional teams consisting of doctors, psychotherapists, occupational and speech therapists accompany children, young people and their families suffering from psychiatric or mental illnesses such as depression, eating disorders, anxiety, developmental or behavioural disorders and ADHD.

Strains and increasing pressure. Christoph Schneidergruber, head of the SOS Children's Villages Outpatient Clinic Carinthia: "Families and young people were heavily burdened by the pandemic, and the effects of social isolation still weigh on many. Added to this are fears and the pressure at school to catch up on performance deficits."

Therapeutic help.

Stress, bad grades, bullying... school phobia. Daniela Tüchler, occupational therapist at the Carinthian SOS Children's Villages Outpatient Clinic, looks after a 15-year-old who no longer wants to go to school. Eventually she comes across one of the triggers: "His transcript was illegible, so he was constantly lagging behind in the school curriculum." How could he be helped? "We worked intensively on fine motor skills using occupational therapy and worked on his insecurities." With great effect: today he is happy to go to school again.

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PREVENTION: SUPPORT FOR THE ENTIRE FAMILY

Family life is not easy.

Sometimes the challenges become too much. For example, when burdens such as illness, excessive demands, unemployment, etc. further unbalance the situation. SOS Children's Villages is convinced that if affected families receive the right support in time, there is a chance in many cases that families can stay together and children do not lose their home with their parents.

In parent-child homes, 125 children are cared for by highly qualified SOS Children's Villages staff together with their parents throughout Austria. In their own flats, children are supported together with their parents for a period of two years so that they can lead an independent life again in the long term.

Around 3/4 of all families cared for in parent-child homes can then successfully start an independent life.



"Moving into my own small flat in the SOS Children's Village Hinterbrühl was very positive for me," says Verena T. She is the mother of two children who were six and two years old when she moved into the parent-child home. She herself has a mental illness. She often reached her limits in the upbringing of her children and felt left alone by her husband. "My problems got bigger and bigger. I couldn't cope with the household, couldn't handle money and forgot appointments." Then she took a courageous step: she actively sought help for her family.

Dzenana Bilic, family counsellor at SOS Children's Villages: "It was important to bring calm and structure into the family's life and to create a stable basis – in other words, to draw up a financial plan and train the family to manage with the available financial means until the end of the month. It was also important to establish a good daily structure, to organise the family. That means, for example, having all the appointments in mind and organising therapies," says Bilic. "It was not always easy, but very successful as you can see today." The mother's relationship with the children has improved due to the calm and structured daily routine. Bilic: "It is very important for us to support parents in perceiving their children's needs and understanding how these are related to their own behaviour." Verena T.: "I had a great desire to change my life. This wish has come true for me."

Pandemic, climate catastrophe and a war in Europe - one crisis report follows the next. This is particularly disastrous for young people. The burden on their shoulders weighs heavily. Excessive demands, depressions and fears of the future increase. SOS Children's Villages therefore drew atten-

tion to the great burden and mental health of the young generation in 2021 and 2022. With an oversised backpack that travelled across Austria, SOS Children's Villages appealed to society and politics to shoulder the current challenges of children and young people together.





A VILLAGE FOR THE WHOLE WORLD

SOS Children's Villages has its origins in Austria; it was founded in Tyrol in 1949. Since then, SOS Children's Villages has been active as an international children's rights organisation for children and young people in 138 countries and territories worldwide.

The impact of our international engagement: Armenia as example

HOPE DESPITE POVERTY AND WAR

The Armenian region of Tavush is one of the poorest region in Europe. In addition to poverty, the conflict with Azerbaijan over Nagorno Karabakh is flaring up again and again. An SOS Children's Villages project helps the people to gain new confidence.

When Marianna was enrolled into the SOS Children's Villages family strengthening project in Armenia, she faced enormous challenges. Her daughter Lili had been diagnosed with a severe heart disorder. The family of six from Tavush in north-eastern Armenia could not afford the necessary medical treatment.

More than a quarter of the population lives in poverty here, and the poverty rate among children is over **40%**. Many people suffer from physical and mental health problems that are a direct result of stressful experiences and war traumata, as well as extremely limited access to effective



treatments. This leads to a greater risk of family crisis situations and domestic violence. A considerable part of the target group lacks knowledge and skills to cope with familial challenges - and this also has a negative impact on the children's personal and educational development and thus on their long-term future prospects.

This is how family strengthening works SOS Children's Villages supports families in this region with: >food parcels

>basic medical care

>psychosocial services in the form of individual and group therapies



> Vocational training: development of business plans up to investments in means of production such as sewing machines or agricultural equipment. As a result more than 60% of the families achieve a higher income

For Marianna, too, much has changed for the better as a result. Her daughter Lili can go to school again. The father can pursue his profession as a welder with the necessary tools, and the family can increase their income with a small farm additionally.

SOS Children's Villages has been active in Armenia for more than 30 years and is one of the largest children's rights organisations in the country. Examples of services: two SOS Children's Villages and youth programmes, emergency response projects and six family strengthening programmes for psychosocial and economic strengthening of families.

SOS CHILDREN'S VILLAGES FAMILY STRENGTHENING **PROGRAMME ARMENIA:**

Objective: To strengthen vulnerable families, especially children, in Tavush, Armenia. The project plays an important role in ensuring effective strengthening of the families' social, emotional, psychological and economic capacities.

Start: 2008. Since 2015 with co-funding from the Austrian Development Agency (ADA) as a mobile family strengthening programme.





A SAFE PLACE FOR REFUGEE CHILDREN

Greece/Lesvos. Just being able to be a child.

This was made possible by SOS Children's Villages for the children from the Kara Tepe II refugee camp on Lesvos in a dedicated day care centre. For most of the children, it was the only way to leave the refugee camp and be in a real house with walls, tables, chairs and toys for the first time in a very long time. Since May 2021, children aged 4 to 17 could come to the house in the capital Mytilini from Monday to Friday for half a day. In addition to lessons in Greek, English and mathematics, they did a lot of handicrafts, practised arithmetic and writing, learned languages and were taught music, biology and geography. Drawings and games were used to work through stressful experiences. In 2021, 409 children were cared for here.



Ukraine Emergency Relief.

SOS Children's Villages acted quickly and unbureaucratically after the outbreak of war: By mid-June 2022 alone, a total of **250** refugees from Ukraine, including **200** children, have received protection and help in Austrian SOS Children's Villages services.

In addition, SOS Children's Villages in Vienna, Lower Austria, Upper Austria and Salzburg support Austrian host families who take in unaccompanied children.

SOS Children's Villages has also set up a children's zone at Vienna's main railway station: here, the youngest children in transit find a child-friendly place to take a breather, play and be a child. Every day, **50-70** children are looked after there (as of May 2022).

SOS Children's Villages has been

the outbreak of the war at the end of February 2022, we have been on site with an emergency relief programme for **500,000** people.

Evacuated from war zones by June 2022: **136** foster families with **1,200** children out of SOS Children's Villages programmes as well as another 6,000 adults and 3,000 children. SOS Children's Villages also provides financial support for **3,100** people in Ukraine and psychological help for **303** people. New drop-in centres for social and material support were established in Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk and Dnipro, among others.



Tvrol. Child-oriented support

At SOS-Kinder.Welt in Innsbruck, children from refugee families find a cosy, child-friendly place four afternoons a week. They can play, do handicrafts, receive support in groups and individually and are prepared for kindergarten and school. Pupils receive regular learning support, and mothers participate in a German language course. Since 2021, families are also visited, strengthened and supported by mobile pedagogical teams.

GOOD TO KNOW

Around 1.700 children and young people found a loving and stable home with SOS Children's Villages in Austria in 2021.



Austria-wide there are ten SOS Children's Villages and numerous other programme locations (see overview map on the last page). The children and young people live in houses or apartments, are cared for and supported by pedagogues and usually also go to kindergarten, school or do an apprenticeship nearby.



Around 3,000 children, young regular counselling and support from SOS Children's Villages

SOS Children's Villages was founded in Tyrol in 1949. At that time, many war orphans needed a new home. Instead of building large children's homes, small villages were set up so that the children and young people could grow up in a secure familial environment.

In the meantime, SOS Children's Villages is an international children's rights organisation and active in 138 countries and territories.

Almost all children and young people who live in an SOS Children's Villages family or group home on a short-, medium- or long-term basis have biological parents.

However, for various reasons, they cannot live with them. Therefore, SOS Children's Villages offers them a loving and stable home and also supports their parents in the meantime. In this way, it is sometimes possible for children to return

to their families.

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As a children's rights organisation, SOS Children's Villages gives young people a "loud voice" in public and actively advocates for the observance of children's rights.

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The helpline 147 is available around the clock for all young people in critical situations or with urgent questions. Every day, around 165 counselling sessions are conducted - by phone, online and via chat - by the multi-professional team of psychologists, life and social counsellors and lawyers. Since 2021, parents have also been able to get counselling online at elternseite.at.
